FIRST AID IN DROWNING

Waste no time in carrying any distance—stop at once and begin resuscitation.

Begin quickly in application of artificial respiration. Save the seconds and you have a better chance of saving the life. Don't waste time carrying victim to a quiet spot. Work where he was taken from the water. Waste no time trying to get the harmless water out of the stomach. Turn subject face down and go to work instantly.

DON'T GIVE UP.

Place the hands just below subject's shoulder blades, four inches apart, with palms turned forward, and thumbs outward. Scrape edges of hands back toward pelvis until they stop.

Move weight of body downward and forward for about three seconds—don't slide, don't bend arms. Keep arms straight. The shoulders should be behind the hands, so that the pressure is exerted forward. Snap hands off allowing the lungs to fill with air. Swing your body slowly backward to an upright position, thus relaxing the muscles of the back.

At the end of two seconds, again place the hands in position and apply pressure. This timing (three seconds pressure and two seconds release) uses five seconds for one complete respiration, or twelve respirations per minute.

To assist in properly timing these movements, repeat either silently or aloud during the period of pressure "out goes the bad air," then snap off hands and repeat during the period of release "in comes good," or count slowly 1, 2, 3 for pressure, and 4, 5 for release, one count for each second.

LIME LAKE

Lime Lake, in the foothills of the Allegheny Mountains, in Cattaraugus County, New York, in the northeast section of the town of Machias, is 100 feet above Lake Erie and covers an expanse of about 500 acres. The lake receives its name because of deposits of shell lime on the lake bottom.

Lime Lake is an artificial lake, originally consisting of three ponds. It was dammed up at the north end about 1839 to provide water power for a feed and saw mill. The lake is fed entirely by springs and has an outlet at the north end and at the south end. The outlet at the northern end flows under the Old Mill Roller Rink into the Cattaraugus Creek, thence into Lake Erie; the southern outlet flows into the Ischua Creek, thence into the Allegheny River.

Lime Lake hamlet is situated at the northern end of Lime Lake. The first settlements were made in 1813; the first school house, a log structure, was built in 1819; the first saw mill was built in 1823 by Andrew McBizzell; the first grist mill in 1823 by David Potter. The first store in this locality was operated by Howard Peck and Alva Jefferson, and the first inn in 1820 by a Widow Freeman. The only woolen mills ever to exist in the town of Machias were at Lime Lake and were run by Messrs. Follett & Colgrove about 1835. These mills were busy night and day, people coming from distant places camping out and waiting to have their work done.

In 1874 and 1875 a flour and grist mill operated by Jacob Wurst and John E. Euchner flourished under the facilities afforded by the lake's water power. In later years the water power of this lake was used by the Queen City Milk Company to operate a modern milk plant which has since ceased operation and is now the Old Mill Roller Skating Rink operated by L. N. Beardsley.

The lake also served as a great source of ice before electric refrigeration and the manufacture of artificial ice. The first ice house was built about 1880 by Newton & Armstrong for the Wester Ice Company of Buffalo and was destroyed by fire. The second ice house was built by W. L. Markham. The third ice house was built by the Citizens Ice Company of Buffalo on the site now occupied by the dance hall at Lime Lake Park about 1888. The Webster Ice Company then constructed three more in the years of 1890, 1892 and 1896. The total capacity of the ice harvest at the lake per year was approximately 145,000 tons. With the advent of electric refrigeration and the manufacture of artificial ice, these ice houses were razed.

What is now the Odosagih Bible Conference Grounds was once known as Hazelmere Park, on the west shore of the lake. On these grounds, high over the lake, stood the famous old Hazelmere Hotel. The hotel was destroyed by fire and the park was not used for many years. Later a dance hall was constructed by Earl Pratt. The Odosagih Bible Conference Association purchased the dance hall and park and have since held their meetings and conferences here. They are continually improving and adding to the grounds. Several cottages are now located on their shore. More information concerning the Odosagih Bible Conference will be found on another page.

Lime Lake has constantly grown in popularity until now about 375 cottages line its shores..

Lime Lake is known for its good fishing, and is heavily stocked each year by the Lime Lake Sportsmen's Club.

The Pennsylvania Railroad runs along the east shore of the lake and crosses the B. & O. R. R. about a mile south of the lake at Machias Junction.

MACHIAS

Machias is located on the elevated tableland between the waters of the Allegheny River and the Cattaraugus Creek. The soil is a clay and gravelly loam suitable for cereal and stock raising. Cheese making was at one time also a major industry, but has died out in recent years.

The village was originally known as Machias Five Corners, or Chickasaw. It was a stopping place for teamsters and travelers on the road between Olean and Buffalo. Major Timothy Butler has the honor of being the first resident of the town, coming here with his family from the state of Maine in 1807. More people kept coming, and gradually a wealthy community sprang up. Mills were erected at the foot of Lime Lake, and many distilleries to make rum out of maple syrup were started.

The old burial ground was located one mile north of Machias village and was called the Brewer Cemetery. About 50 years after the formation of this old cemetery, the present one, known as the Maple Grove Cemetery, was established. It lies $\frac{1}{2}$ mile west of the village in a sheltered, shady spot. However, a still older cemetery than the Brewer Cemetery existed until a few years ago. It is in the Gulf District, so was known as the Gulf Cemetery. On Memorial Day in 1940, a ceremony was held at the Maple Grove Cemetery while the remains of the old Revolutionary soldiers buried in the old Gulf Cemetery were interred in the newer burial place.



The first schoolhouse was built in 1827 with Amerilla Brown as its mistress. The school was located one mile north of the village, but burned down in 1830. About 1900 a new school was built on the present site of the newer part of the school still standing, but in 1913 this too, burned down. The very next year the school was rebuilt, and stands today with an addition made in 1935.

In 1827 too, the first Post Office was established, with Joseph Kinne, Jr., as the Postmaster.

Machias was chosen for the site of the County Farms, and buildings were erected on the present location in 1835. The original stone building burned, but was rebuilt in 1869.

The first religious sect to be founded in the town was the Free Will Baptist. Today there are four churches in the town—the Methodist, Congregational-Christian, Wesleyan and St. Christopher Churches, and all hold services every Sunday.

The Methodist Church was organized in 1822 with five members. Meetings were first held in the schoolhouse. In 1839 the Methodist, Christians, and entire community jointly built the present Congregational-Christian Church. The Methodists broke away and erected their own private church in 1853.

The first Congregational-Christian Church was established in 1827 by Joseph Bartlet, and it, also, had five members to begin with.

The third church was the Wesleyan Methodist Church organized in 1888 by Reverend B. F. McLaughlin.

The fourth church, St. Christopher, was built by cottage owners in 1941 at the north end of the lake with first services starting in July.

Phillips Post, No. 329, G. A. R. was founded in 1883 by Col. W. H. Hicks of Arcade. George A. Stoneman was the first commander.

The Masonic Lodge was established in 1894 with William A. Joslyn the first master. The building was erected in 1894 by D. S. Tilden, his son, and Dr. Clarence King.

The Western New York and Pennsylvania Railroad enters Machias from Yorkshire near the northeast corner and runs nearly straight south. The Rochester branch of the Buffalo, Rochester and Pittsburgh Railroad enters the northeast corner and crosses the Western New York and Pennsylvania.

Machias Junction is called such because it is at the crossing point of the Western New York and Pennsylvania, and the Buffalo, Rochester and Pittsburgh Railroads. There is a store located there, and a number of houses. A postoffice was established there when the Junction first materialized, but June 29, 1940, this was removed. The Junction people now get their mail on a route from Machias.

There was another shipping point of some importance in Machias called the Summit Station, and was established in the southwestern part of the town, on the Rochester branch of the Buffalo, Rochester and Pittsburgh Railroad. Summit Station contained some stores, a school house and about a dozen dwellings. This station gradually diminished in importance and thus in population until now only a few of the buidings remain.

Located near Lime Lake, Machias is noted as one of the beauty spots of Cattaraugus County.

ODOSAGIH BIBLE CONFERENCE

This organization came into being 29 years ago, when a small group of ministers and laymen from seven different denominations in this region gathered in what was known as Hazelmere Grove. The first conferences were conducted only a few days each year until some years ago the time was increased to 15 days each session.

In 1927 the 23 acres, including buildings, was purchased for \$13,000. This has been paid. Thousands of dollars' worth of equipment has been added during the years. The work has reached out in Youth Conference, Girls' Camp and Boys' Camp. This is not only a Christian Center for Odosagih, but other groups, as the American Sunday School Union, Buffalo Fundamental Youth Conference and Christian Missionary Alliance, make use of the grounds.

Five or six other conferences throughout New York and Pennsylvania are the outgrowth of Odosagih. Great Bible teachers have brought inspiration to thousands of people and the churches of Western New York, Pennsylvania and Ohio have been greatly strengthened. This interdenominational work is carried on by free will offerings. About 15 missionaries are now in the foreign field who caught their vision at Odosagih.

Besides the meetings held in the spacious tabernacle, some of the most important are the groups of 100 to 200 gathered in devotional services about campfires in the woods. The hills, lake and wooded grounds give an ideal setting for recreational and spiritual atmosphere. Nearly every year a large number are baptized in the lake.

Founder, John E. Whitney, Peckville, Pa., has been president since it beginning.



PUBLIC ORDINANCE

Ordinance of the Town of Machias relating to speed
and operation of boats on Lime Lake

SECTION NO. I

Definitions:

1. Boats shall mean any floating craft except diving rafts, and shall belong to one of the following classes:
 - (a) Motor boats shall include every boat propelled in any manner other than by hand, feet or by wind.
 - (b) Any floating craft not enumerated in above.

PUBLIC ORDINANCE

(Continued)

2. Owner shall mean the person actually holding the title to a boat.
3. Operator shall mean an individual who operates or navigates a boat.
4. Under way shall mean that the boat is not at anchor, made fast to the shore or aground.
5. Starboard shall mean the right side, facing the bow of the boat.
6. Port shall mean the left side, facing the bow of the boat.

SECTION NO. II

Regulations:

1. The owner of each boat which will operate on the waters of Lime Lake shall file an application for the registry with the Town Clerk, on a form provided by him. The application shall state the dimensions of the boat, type of power unit and other data, which the Board considers essential for complete identification of the boat. The application shall be signed by the owner of the boat with verification of his ownership. Upon receipt of the application in approved form the Town Clerk will enter the same on the records of his office and issue a certificate of registration, stating the number assigned to him. The owner shall paint on or attach to each side of the bow of the boat the identification number in such position as to be displayed in a conspicuous manner with figures and letters at least 4 inches in height, and not less than one-half inch in width: white on all but white boats and black to be used on white boats. In case of a boat carrying Federal License number, color contrasting to the boat will be used to underline the number, giving it a Lime Lake identification mark.

2. The Town Clerk is authorized and empowered to grant licenses upon the payment of \$1.00 annual fee for each boat registered for the calendar year from January 1 to December 31. Licenses will not be issued from 12:00 Noon Saturday until Monday 9:00 A. M.

3. Every operator of a motor boat shall at all times navigate the same in a careful and prudent manner and at such rate of speed as not to endanger the property of another or the life or limb of any person. Reckless navigation of a motor boat shall include operating the same in a manner which unnecessarily interferes with the free and proper use of the waters of Lime Lake, or unnecessarily endangering other boats therein or the life or limb of any person. Every motor boat approaching or passing any other boat or bathing beach shall be slowed down to a speed that will cause no damage to the occupants of such other boat or bathing beach. No motor boat shall be operated within 100 feet of shore at a speed exceeding (5) miles per hour.

4. The exhaust of every internal combustion engine used on any motor boat on the waters of Lime Lake shall be effectively muffled by equipment so constructed and used to muffle the noise of the exhaust in a reasonable manner. The use of cut-out and sirens is prohibited.

5. Every motor boat in excess of five horsepower shall have life preservers, life belts or buoyant cushions which shall be in sufficient numbers to provide safety for those on board. No boat, canoe or other craft shall be loaded to more than its seating capacity. Each boat shall have no less than four inches of space from gunwale to the water, however the enforcement officer shall have the authority to order off the lake any over-loaded boat at his discretion.

6. Every boat when under way, or while at rest, as used for fishing upon the waters of Lime Lake during the hours from sunset to sunrise shall carry a white light aft to show all around the horizon.

7. Proper signs setting forth the above regulations and whom to notify in case of disturbance or accident shall be posted at the boat liveries operating on the lake, in each cottage and at other places of lake entry as may be necessary to enlighten visitors.

8. Any operator of a boat will be held responsible for any violation of this ordinance.

9. Any violation of this ordinance shall be an infraction punishable by a fine not to exceed \$50.00 or 30 days imprisonment, or both, and/or license may be revoked or suspended.

SECTION NO. III

Issuance of Summons and Procedures Thereon

1. Upon violation of any of the provisions of Section II of these ordinances of the Town of Machias, either within or without his presence, any constable, Sheriff or Deputy Sheriff of the County of Cattaraugus, is hereby authorized to issue summonses in the following form, the blanks to be filled in by the officer as the case may be:

To the owner or operator of the boat bearing the above Town of Machias License No. -----:

This boat has been maintained or operated at Lime Lake in the Town of Machias in violation of the ordinance of the Town of Machias as indicated above. You are hereby required to appear before -----, Justice of Peace, at his office and residence in the Town of Machias on:

Failure to appear will subject the registered owner or operator of said boat to a fine.

2. Time To Appear:

The summons mentioned in the last preceding section shall require the defendant's appearance not less than two or more than ten days after the service of the same, except that upon demand, the defendant may appear forthwith.

3. Service of Summons:

The Summons mentioned in the last preceding section may be served by delivering to and leaving with the defendant personally, either within or without the Town of Machias, a copy thereof; or by attaching the same in a prominent place to any boat which is found in or on Lime Lake in violation of these ordinances.

4. Punishment For Failure To Appear:

Failure of the owner or operator of said boat to appear in response to a summons, a warrant shall be issued for arrest and shall be punishable by a fine of not less than \$10.00 nor more than \$50.00.

5. This ordinance drafted July 7, 1947, and amended March 2, 1953, will be effective April 1, 1953.

SAFETIES FOR SWIMMING

1. Never take foolish chances in or around the water.
2. Never call "Help" unless you really need it! (Without cause it is a serious offense).
3. Don't splash about wildly, pretending that you are drowning. Many times a drowning person is unable to call for help and only his actions indicate his predicament.
4. Pushing an unsuspecting person off the dock or raft, may cause a serious accident.
5. Allow two hours to elapse after meal time, before taking swim.
6. If you must enter strange waters in a hurry, do so feet first, with legs together.
7. If a leg or arm cramp develops, be calm, call for "Help" and quietly float until, either you are assisted or the cramp leaves. A leg or foot cramp may be worked out, even in the water. Squeeze the cramp hard with your hands. This is called the "Punishment Method" and will necessitate going below the surface.
8. Weeds are dangerous. If the feet should become entangled, do not struggle frantically, move slowly, going down with the hands to untangle them.
9. Keep your swimming area, bottom and shore, free from foreign articles.
10. Never swim without at least one companion, who is either swimming with you or watching—and capable of giving help.
11. Do not over-estimate your ability. Many expert swimmers have lost their lives when they swam too far out, tired, were out of reach of quick help and so went down.
12. In long distance lake swimming, (anything over 200 yards) a young swimmer should be accompanied by a boat manned by two people.
13. At all times, keep calm. People drown when they become foolishly terrified and forget how easy it is to float.

IN DIVING

1. Know the absolute depth of the water and the bottom conditions before diving in. A blow on the head caused by hitting the bottom may crack one's skull.
2. "Look before you leap" in taking a dive. Someone may be just coming to the surface in the very spot where you planned to light.
3. Swim away promptly from the point of entry, off the spring board. This enables other swimmers to dive without delay.
4. Following is the minimum safe depth of water for diving from various elevations:

1 foot	6 feet
3 feet	7 feet
5 feet	8 feet
7 feet	9 feet
10 feet	10 feet
5. Do not hit the spring board in the take-off jump with toes over the edge. Keep back from the edge about 2 inches. This assures more "lift."
6. High diving requires that upon entry, the body be rigid, the arms well out and protecting the head with thumbs locked. Many a limply held arm has been dislocated by the force of the impact.
7. Pick out a high cloud and dive up for that. This gives height to your dives.

IN SWIMMING

1. Never hold your nose when going under, unless it be in a high feet-first jump, at which time the pressure will force water up the nostrils.
2. Don't stay in the water too long. Two periods of one-half hour each a day are sufficient, and more healthful.
3. Come out when you first begin to shiver. It is nature's signal that "enough's enough."
4. Dry thoroughly with a rough towel. Make certain that the feet and toes are well dried, or the skin will crack between the toes.
5. Wear slippers or old shoes down to swimming. There will be fewer stubbed toes.
6. In swimming keep your fingers together. Do not work too hard—take your strokes easily and with rhythm.
7. Breathe in through the mouth and exhale through the nose.

VACATION EMERGENCIES

● What first-aid equipment is necessary for vacation?

The American Red Cross advises a first-aid kit that contains an assortment of materials in standard packages of unit size, with enough applications and dressings for at least one injury. (Refills can be bought). Always buy the best. A kit should be compact, convenient, easily transportable. Well-known manufacturers make various types and sizes suitable for travel and home use.

● What should a kit include?

About 6 bandages: 2 of 1-inch, 2 each of 2- and 3-inch width.

12 to 16 sterile gauze pads on adhesive tape.

6 sterile, folded, absorbent gauze pads—either 3 or 4 inches square.

40-inch, triangle bandage; 2 safety pins.

¼ pound of absorbent cotton.

Skin disinfectant: small bottle or on coated applicators.

Aromatic spirits of ammonia. A ½-ounce bottle with dose marked, "One-half teaspoonful in water," or small box of ammonia inhalants in ampoules, to be broken by the fingers.

Tube of ointment or jelly for burns.

Roll of 1-inch adhesive plaster. Scissors.

Twist-type tourniquet is included in many kits, especially those for carrying in automobiles. (Learn how to use a tourniquet.)

● Are there other useful things?

Yes. A good pair of tweezers for removing splinters and bee stings; laundry soap, which you can soften in water and rub on skin exposed to poison ivy; calomine or its equivalent, for bites and stings; salt tablets, to be taken in hot, humid weather. Three or 4 wooden tongue depressors are useful—as finger splints, for example. Take a sterilized medicine dropper and a small, sterilized bottle, filled with sterile water, to flush the eye to remove a foreign body. (Your doctor may advise an eye lotion instead.)

Every adult should have taken a first-aid course. If you haven't, buy the American Red Cross First-Aid Textbook (60 cents) and study it. Standard first-aid kits contain an instruction guide or folder.

● Are there general rules in case of accident?

The usual advice is: call a doctor; keep calm; speak quietly; do not frighten the injured person; if you do not know the correct procedure, do nothing. Keep the injured person lying flat, and do not move him unless he is in immediate danger from fire, etc. Use common sense.

● What is the treatment for snakebite?

If the snake is poisonous, use mechanical suction to withdraw the poison at or near the bite, and moderate tourniquet pressure between the bite and the heart, to retard circulation, thus slowing down poison absorption. If the snake is non-poisonous, wash the wound at once with water, or soap and water, if possible. Apply 2-percent tincture of iodine.

Keep the bitten person lying down and comfortable. Don't let him rise or walk; exertion might be dangerous. For faintness, use aromatic spirits of ammonia or an ammonia inhalant. Don't use whisky.

Vacation Emergencies Continued

- If vacation is spent near water, should some member of the family know artificial respiration?

Yes. It is wise to have someone take a lifesaving course. Also, immediately find out from the nearest hospital or police station what number to phone for help.

- What method is best?

The Prone Pressure Method. Explicit directions are given in first-aid manuals. Practice it on a husky member of the family until you could do it easily even if you were excited. In case of submersion, don't waste time trying to get water out of the lungs—start artificial respiration at once.

- What rules about water are wise?

Here are eight simple suggestions; you may add more.

1. A child who can't swim should wear an adequate life preserver when he's on a dock or in a sail-, motor- or rowboat. Test the life preserver to show how well it supports the child in the water, so he won't be frightened with it on.
2. Persons who don't swim well never should get into a canoe.
3. A child should not go swimming unless a responsible person is near by.
4. For even moderate distance swims, someone should go along in a boat.
5. Children should come out of the water at once if they are cold, blue or feel sick.
6. No one should swim during a thunderstorm.
7. Don't dive in strange waters. Know the water's depth and the condition of the bottom. Children with sinus, nose, throat, and ear complications shouldn't dive. Ask your doctor's advice about each child.
8. Wait two hours after a full meal before swimming.

- What about sunburn?

Prevent it if you can. Cover the skin before it reddens or feels hot to the touch. Treat sunburn like any other burn. There are many good ointments that ease discomfort. A doctor should prescribe for a child with severe sunburn or extensive blistering. (Tincture of iodine never should be applied.)

- What is heat exhaustion?

Excessive heat exposure causes loss of water and salt from the body. The symptoms of heat exhaustion are pallor, clammy perspiration, cold skin, weak pulse, faintness. Occasionally there may be abdominal or muscular cramps. The symptoms may be extreme fatigue.

- What is the remedy?

Salt and water. Salt tablets or ordinary salt may be given with swallows of water, or the child may drink a salt-and-water solution—one teaspoonful to one pint.

MACHIAS YOUTH PROGRAM

The Town of Machias conducts a Youth Program under the direction of a trained instructor; offering swimming for all. Children from the 1st grade through high school may attend.

Baseball and other sports will be played in the afternoon.

Registration can be made at the Town Clerk's Office. Watch your local newspaper for registration dates. Jack Gaeta will be the instructor.

This is offered five days a week, July 6 through August 15, and is open to all in the area.




